



# STARTING OUT RIGHT-UNIVERSITY AND EDUCATIONAL FAIRS

At this stage, you'll want to know your options and one of the best places to look are education fairs. # THE DO'S AND DON'TS

# Do ask about student life

It's vital to consider the environment and campus life of your choice institutions. Along with the compatibility of the programmes offered, your interests and passions outside the classroom are important too. Initiate a conversation with alumni present at university fairs. This is an excellent opportunity to hear first hand experiences about the culture of the institution.

# • Do your research

Performing ample research on your top choice institutions is an important preparation step most prospective students overlook. "The more research you do in advance, the better your questions will be. If you want to stand out, it will be through the questions you ask," Mr Kwan said. Preparation will make your trip to the fair worthwhile and even score points for the selection process while you are at it!

# • Do think about future prospects


Adopt a forward thinking mentality and determine how the institution can help you develop holistically towards your career upon graduation. In addition, consider the school's professional networks and social connections. These will be key when you are searching for career prospects in the future.

# Don't ask basic questions

"Leave out simple questions about the school which you can already find on the websites," Mr Kwan said. The short five minutes or so for each prospective student will only be able to cater to 2 to 3 questions, so be sure to ask very specific and meaningful questions.

## Don't leave a bad impression

Be wary of your demeanor during these discussions as the person you are talking to could be your future professor!

"Professionalism is in me. If I can excel in the army with only a 7-year education, I can come up with a karaoke system for my cab," muses Mr Jeffrey Tan, or rather famously known as "the Singing Singapore Cabbie".

For a rainy and moody-looking afternoon, Mr Jeff (as he would rather be called) graces the Campus office looking bright and cheery. His affability and sincerity shines through the way he carries himself, despite the numerous mentions he has on local and international media regarding his five-figure sum karaoke system he has installed in his cab.

He reveals to Campus that he doesn't care if he's dubbed a "celebrity cabbie". Says Mr Jeft: "It helps in the business but I'm just a cabbie. We're living in a stressful, fast-paced world. 


# THE AIR-CONDITIONED NATION





# SCIENCE/FICTION

n. A literary or cinematic genre in which fantasy, typically based on speculative scientific discoveries or developments, environmental changes, space travel, or life on other planets, forms part of the plot or background.

"We want wisdom. We want hope. We want to be good. Therefore we sometimes tell ourselves warning stories that deal with the darker side of some of our other wants. As William Blake noted long ago, the human imagination drives the world." -Margaret Atwood


It is the truth universally acknowledged that the stories about the future mirror out our hopes and fears about life in the present. A recognisable literary tradition was conceived during the industrial revolution and born during later half of the 19th century in Jules Verne's Les Voyages Extraordinaire and H.G. Wells' fin-de-siècle "scientific romances"

However, the science fiction genre obtained its name and social identity during the early decades of 20th century in American pulp magazines in the golden age of bug-eyed monsters and girls in brass brassieres.

It has been a long journey ever since, and here, we will try to converge probably one of the most controversial, diverse and impressive genre of fiction.



# THE SCIENCE OF FICTION

Most readers perceive science fiction as just 'fiction', but popular themes from sci-fi stories are becoming increasingly more factual than fictional. As Rod Serling, creator of The Twilight Zone, puts it: "Fantasy is the impossible made probable. Science fiction is the improbable made possible," which some of these themes suggest:

## APOCALYPTIC

Apocalyptic fiction is concerned with the end of civilisation through war (On the Beach), pandemic (The Last Man) or astronomical impact (When Worlds Collide). Popular novels include H.G. Wells' War of Worlds, or Cormac McCarthy's The Road.

> The apocalypse genre gained popularity after

WWII, but the possibility of global annihilation due to nuclear war cannot be completely overruled. The genre also outlines natural catastrophe, and with recent Japanese tsunami and global pandemic such as H1N1 and SARS, the idea does not seem so far-fetched now.

The term 'Space Opera' describes adventure science fiction set in outer space or on distant planets, but ever since man landed on the moon in 1969, real life space adventure has become an attainable reality.

In space opera fiction, the emphasis is on action rather than either science or characters, and the conflict is heroic, and typically on a large scale. Titles of this genre include Douglas Adams' Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy and the immensely popular Star Wars trilogies.

Superhuman stories deal with the emergence of humans who have abilities beyond the norm something like a cyborg. While most fiction of this genre deal with super strong humans with robot insides, real-life cyborgs have been in existence for decades in the medical world. Mechanical Pacemakers now help those with heart problems, while robotic arms and legs replace lost limbs.

Military science fiction include details about military technology, procedure, ritual and history and may use parallels with historical conflicts), set in the context of conflict between national, interplanetary, or interstellar armed forces. Robert Heinlein's Starship Troopers is an early example, along with Joe Haldeman's The Forever War, a Vietnam-era response to the WWII-style stories of earlier authors.

The superhuman genre also deals with the

While the outer space setting is still far off, some of the military technology, like laser weapons, robots and sonic blasters, exist today.

The cyberpunk genre emerged in the early 1980s, combining "cybernetics" and "punk" (coined by author Bruce Bethke for his 1980 short story Cyberpunk). Some examples include Philip K Dick's Bladerunner and William Gibson's Neuromancer. The time frame is usually near-future and the settings are often dystopian (characterised by misery), although such cities, like Rio de Janeiro or Hong Kong, do resemble them today.

Common themes in cyberpunk include advances in information technology (especially the internet as cyberspace), AI and prosthetics, and post-democratic societal control where corporations have more influence than governments (something that can easily be possible in today's world where money is concerned).

# THE FICTION OF SCIENCE

While many science fiction elements are being realised, the human imagination and ingenuity mean that sometimes, science can't quite catch up. Yet.

Time Travel is the only science fiction concept which still remains fiction, as we yet don't possess the capability to reproduce a time travel vehicle as proposed by HG Wells' 1895 novel The Time Machine.

Ever since Einstein proposed theory of general relativity in 1905, the science world has delved into the concept, and came up with wormholes and quantum entanglement, yet the idea is to be proved.

Related to time travel is the sci-fi genre of Alternate (or Alternative) History which is based on the premise that historical events might have turned out differently, as depicted in the story of The Man in the High Castle by Philip K. Dick, in which Germany and Japan win World War II.

WHAT IS IT?

Those of you who've seen the TV series "Six Feet Under" will be familiar with this profession. Basically. mortuary science involves death, and seven days. If you're imagining "seven days" as a crackly voice on the telephone. you watch too many horror flicks.

The job begins when someone dies, and seven days is all you have to embalm and bury/cremate a body before it decomposes. However, it's more involved than just preparing bodies for funerals: it also includes elements of counselling, as well as managing funerary operations and keeping up-to-date with relevant laws. In short. it's the business of the inevitability of life - and we're not talking taxes.



# HOW DO YOU GET THERE?

Just because you're dealing with clients who are already dead, it doesn't mean you can simply pump bodies with preservatives and slap on makeup unless you want to scare the audience to death.

Just to be a funeral director, you'll need:
- 2 years of college (in mortuary science) - I year's experience as an apprentice

- a qualifying examination for licence


There aren't any schools in Singapore that teach Mortuary Science (yet), and many local embalmers are trained overseas in countries like the USA. Australia and New Zealand.



# WHO DOES IT?

Traditionally, these are family businesses, but due to an ageing population and aged morticians. there is a demand for fresh talent. While there isn't stiff competition and it's not the kind of job folks are dying to do, it's a business that won't go extinct, simply because nobody lives forever.

As a licensed mortician, there are job opportunities worldwide. Some folks make a killing at this business - top funeral directors make more than US\$90.000 a year in salaries in the U.S. The business isn't a dead end career - there are funeral conventions and online communities to keep folks up-to-date with the latest trends.



# WHAT'S IN THE NAME?

Morticians, coroners and forensic pathologists all see dead people. For work, that is.

Those who end up working in funeral homes are generally funeral directors or morticians and usually deal with bereaved families, and tend to do everything from embalming to stock-taking of coffins, and are often known for their consoling words.

A coroner is a government officer who investigates deaths that occur under suspicious circumstances (ie. a bullet in the head) and may use a forensic pathologist do the autopsy. They (as well as those who watch too much "CS") are known for using cheem words like "exsanguination" and "myocardial infarction."


# WHAT IT TAKES





# a virtual World that cam justice by roshi kapur

Cell phones, blogs, Facebook posts, tweets, photos and especially videos, triggered the Arab revolution that began in Pecember 2010. Six months down the road, many Arab countries are still engulfed in internal struggles between the masses and government forces. Some say this revolutionary phase was in Europe in the late 1980s.

But a stark disparity lies in the mechanism of these revolutionary, civil disobediences. People were not equipped with the same technology two decades ago as we are now. Pigital media platforms - especially social media - is radically transforming our virtual and cyber environment.
One from the west is easily connected to his counterpart
from the east. Technological devices such as the Blackberry and iPhone are bridging the big gaps of communication and are making us closer to one another as never before.





So what exactly happened in some Arab countries that made people from all walks of life so angry and

On December 17, 2010, an ordinary Tunisian street vendor, Mohamed Bouazízí conducted an act of self-immolation. He was so despaired by constant humiliation and harassment from the corrupted Tunisian authorities who confiscated his last valuable belonging, a weighing scale. Out of humiliation, he set himself on fire. His death sparked a fiery and intensive rage all over Tunisia, leading the then-President Zine El Abidine Ben Ali to step down after 23 years in power.

# digital quest for liberty

This reaction proliferated to other Arab states where long-standing governments had been exploiting their power for decades, and sparked a similar reaction. The whole of Middle East saw a wave of demonstrations and violent protests where many autocrats were pressured to resign from their seats and face charges such as former president of Egyptian president Hosni Mubarak who's facing charges for misappropriating public

The youth were so emotionally despaired with the poor economic opportunities in their country, especially the fresh graduates who found it impossible to find a proper job in the working world. Using new digital media was the ideal platform to share their desperate conditions with others: one could easily snap a picture or record a video with an iPhone and immediately post it on the internet for the whole world to see.

Visuals of fresh rounds of protests were recorded with ordinary mobile phones and posted on the internet. Pictures and videos of police and military forces flogging and beating up protestors can easily be accessed on sites like Youtube, Facebook and other social media. The whole world could see what exactly was happening from Tunisia all the way to Syria. Young activists even created a Facebook group in remembrance of Mohamed Bouazizi.

No one would have imagined what the plight of civilians was had it not been for digital and social media. While traditional media also played a contributing factor for disseminating the information, even television channels such as the popular Al Jazeera was part of the social media


# struggle is not over

# The Future of Medicine in Third World Nations

# WHAT IS PREVENTING MEDICAL PROGRESSION IN THESE COUNTRIES?

Modern medicine is the unyielding symbol of human progress. In this brave new world of globalisation, technological evolution and health advancement, those living in industrialised nations have numerous prevention and treatment options, including seeking specialised medical treatments overseas. For example, the most popular destination for cancer treatment is Southeast Asia and Latin America. The expertise and affordable price make it lucrative for medical tourists to go across borders rather than seek treatment in their home country.

National boundaries are becoming increasingly porous in light of the ever-complex, growing global economy. Every day, a typical Singaporean consumes at least one imported product—from Egyptian strawberries and French medicinal drugs to foreign television programmes. Many believe that medicine too would be borderless and everyone would have access to at least simple medication and sanitation. In some parts of the world, this is true.

While those living in industrialised nations have access to all kinds of drugs – from weight loss pills to antidepressants – what about those in less-developed countries?

Across the globe, millions of individuals struggle to receive even basic healthcare.

Why are these countries so far behind? An interview with Gloria Chan of Médecins Sans Frontières (Hong Kong) gives us some insights.





# Inaccessible Medicine

As the advancement of medical practices allow for cheaper drugs to be produced, it's only logical that is should be easier for the poor to receive medication globally as well. However, the future isn't so bright and the national boundaries are not as porous for everyone.

Advancements in technology and medicine are not entirely applicable to residents in third world countries and those torn in conflict. Sometimes it is difficult to gain access to people who need the medical attention the most in violence-prone areas and those marred by poverty. Some might think it's the government restriction imposed on good Samaritan doctors who travel across borders in the name of providing help to those who truly need it. However, it is not always the refusal of the governing power but rather the situation of that country.


Take for instance the dilemma of Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF or Doctors without Borders), in the ongoing Libyan conflict. MSF is an international, independent organisation for medical humanitarian aid and has helped over 80 countries since its establishment in 1971. When MSF arrived at Libya 2 days after the conflict erupted in February, the border was already closed. Help and medicine was ready to be distributed but there was no access to the people. Doctors in Libya were explicitly calling out for additional back-up to tend to the wounded. However the border was closed for security reasons. MSF had to find an alternative route through Egypt to finally reach the east side of Libya. Even then, they had to travel to the west part of Libya where the conflict was ongoing. Despite the availability of medicine, not everyone could enjoy its benefits.


# High Cost of Medicine

Not only can some countries not even receive medicine, some cannot even afford it if were accessible.

The advancement of medicine would inevitably cheapen its price, and the obvious way to do this would be the production of more generic drugs in the future. These are not fake drugs but medicine of equivalent quality. The only difference is that generic drugs are not branded by any company and thus, far cheaper. This would seemingly solve the problems of the poor because they don't have to fork out thousands just to receive treatment.

However, affordability differs in various countries depending on their living conditions. Even if more patients can afford the drug, the sustainability of the country's health system is a bigger question. Sometimes all you need is to refrigerate the drugs, but most households in places like South Sudan don't have that luxury. As such, the advancement of that drug is simply not applicable to this part of the world.

The future of medicine may be brighter in some parts of the world than others. This is mainly because the research caters to the majority of the paying consumers whose circumstance far differs from those who do not have access to or cannot afford medicine.

The evolution of medicine cannot exist in a vacuum: it requires an intricate balance of medical professionals creating a system that can help the locals' health according to their living conditions. Otherwise, existing or future drugs cannot necessarily help everyone. Still, the realm of medicine is dynamic; we are that much closer to finding a cure to illnesses everyday as we are to discovering new diseases. Only the future itself can reveal whether our ingenuity can outpace the ailments nature throws at us.


This beautiful folk village boasts a large collection of thatched and tiled traditional houses. Set around a quiet river are a temple, a Confucian school and shrine, a market, a magistrate's house with examples of punishments, storehouses, and all sorts of household furnishings and tools. Be riveted by the quaint, rural village atmosphere where artisans wearing hanbok (traditional Korean clothing) create pots and weave bamboo. Don't worry, retail exists-buy your favourite handmade confection back home as a keepsake!





# JEONGBANG WATERFALL

Next, proceed to viewing the majesty of Jeongbang Waterfall. One exciting fact: this is the only waterfall in Asia that cascades directly into the sea! Not only is it way gorgeous, the falls is also accessible from Seogwipo Harbor in Seogwipo-si (Seogwipo City). It takes the intrepid traveller 30 mins to get there on foot from the Cheonjiyeon Waterfall, Saeyeon Bridge and Saeseom Island; all three in the immediate vicinity of Seogwipo Harbor.



Shanghai, China



# CRYSTAL ISLAND (postponed)



# FREEDOM SHIP (not begun)


Proposed as a city at sea that circumnavigates the globe every 3 years, it's supposed to contain commercial and residential sites, as well as docks and airstrip.














# WHAT TO DO
